


















Guide Dogs Australia named Most Trusted Charity third year running!

For the third year running, Guide Dogs has been voted Australia's Most Trusted Charity in the annual Australian Reader's Digest Most Trusted Brand poll.

The award is based on the results of an independent survey commissioned by Reader's Digest that has been conducted annually for the last 13 years. Guide Dogs Australia was recognised for its services, including providing Guide Dogs to Australians who are blind or vision impaired for over 60 years.

Guide Dogs Victoria CEO Karen Hayes is thrilled to have the organisation acknowledged for the third year in a row. "Over the years the public has been so supportive of the work we do, so as part of the Guide Dogs family, I'd like to express my sincere appreciation for this recognition," she said. In Victoria alone, there are 220,000 people living with some form of permanent vision loss with this figure expected to grow to 350,000 people by 2020.





This time last year, Kathryn and Guide Dog Sammie received a certificate from Guide Dogs Victoria: it was a graduation certificate!

Sammie and I met on my 21st birthday. It was love at first sight. For the next month and a half I dreamed about what life with her would be like..."

Before Guide Dogs Victoria's graduation day, life wasn't so happy for 22-year old Kathryn who dreamt of independence, driving a car and getting on with her life. Bilateral Coloboma had interfered with her leading an independent life.

Kathryn also suffers from an eye condition called 'Nystagmus', which causes involuntary motions of the eyes. When she experiences extreme emotions or stress her nystagmus worsens to such a degree that she cannot see at all.



Kathryn attended Arnold Cook House, our training centre for people who are vision-impaired, where they learn to live and work with the Guide Dog we have selected for them.

Kathryn recalls: "Sammie and I had to learn about each other. We had to work together until she trusted me and I trusted her. When I finally took her home, Sammie instantly became a family favourite."

Kathryn can also enjoy a working life now that she's got Sammie. She works at her local San Churro coffee shop, where she is employed as head barista.

"I took Sammie to the job interview and my boss fell in love with her. My colleagues have done their best to keep Sammie comfortable. After hours my colleagues keep me back so that they can gradually introduce me to other stations in the coffee shop. They're so caring."

Sammie has opened doors for Kathryn: "Without Sammie and Guide Dogs Victoria, I'd probably be struggling at university and I probably wouldn't have made it into the work force. And I'd have no independence."

It all began with Rosie

A few years ago, I witnessed a close friend and distinguished architect gradually lose his sight. This experience made me realise how fundamental our eye sight is. It's the most valuable sense we've got and it's so incredibly important that we look after it".

John's support began in 2011 when he sponsored a puppy and named it after his wife, Rosie. Since then, John has been the proud sponsor of four more puppies. "This is a wonderful program which gives me much happiness. I really enjoy the involvement that I have with the puppy; it's great to come out to the Guide Dogs Victoria campus at the various stages of development to see my puppy being trained. I attended the street walk with Rosie when she was more advanced and it was fascinating to see what she could achieve; this would be my favourite part of the program. Attending Graduation Day each year to see



your dog graduate is also a very rewarding and proud moment."

John has also been lucky enough to meet one of his sponsored dogs along with its new owner. "It was an interesting experience and one I won't forget. It was enjoyable to meet the handler in person; she was so very grateful for her Guide Dog and explained how it had changed her life for the better, giving her far more confidence and independence. This made me so very proud to have been able to help provide something that most of us just take for granted."

Since starting his first puppy sponsorship, John hasn't looked back and continues to support the breeding program to help provide highly qualified Guide Dogs to those who need them most

Jaryd's triumph

At just sixteen years of age, Jaryd Clifford has the world at his feet. He also doesn't let his vision impairment get in the way of his passion for sports, especially in cross country running.

Jaryd was diagnosed with Juvenile Macular Degeneration at age 3, which leaves him with severe central vision loss. He began receiving services with Guide Dogs Victoria at age 4.

He began his running career during primary school. But it wasn't until he qualified for his first National Cross Country Championships at age 13 that he began his serious training with Coach Max Balchin.

Jaryd says,


I enjoy distance running as it gives me the feeling of freedom, that I can do anything! I love to run, if I'm not running I'm studying my idols or my rivals."

Jaryd already has many awards under his belt. He won the School Sport Australia National Cross Country in the 3km, 16-19 years category at the Moonee Valley race course with an impressive time of 9 minutes 9 seconds. He was also part of a winning team who won the Australian School sport 4 x 1km relay race.

More recently, Jaryd's dream of representing Australia on a global stage has come true. He has been selected to represent Australia at the International Paralympic championships in the Vision Impaired 5000m category in Doha, Qatar, in October. He will be one of the youngest competitors in the field. Though he's nervous, he's looking toward the future: "Doha will be a major step in my chances to qualify for next year's Paralympic Games which will be in Rio." This is extremely exciting and we congratulate and wish Jaryd the best of luck for the race.



A message from the President on GDV Membership



We at Guide Dogs Victoria (GDV) wish you the very best for the new financial year and thank you for your support during 2014/15.

The success of GDV is very dependent on a wide range of people, including our donors and volunteers (including our puppy raisers). One of these mechanisms is the overview of the financial year's outcomes and plans for the following financial year that is presented at the November Annual General Meeting (AGM). The Members are provided with a copy of the Annual Report prior to this meeting that overviews the years outcomes and plans.
