Explore Melbourne – Senior Mobility Camp January2016

15 Secondary school students came to stay at Melbourne University during the January holidays to attend the Explore Melbourne mobility camp. The students had fun learning the layout of the city, how to use public transport and develop skills and strategies for travel within the busy Melbourne CBD environment. Students enjoyed mobility challenges and also got to plan their own activities.

Activities

Monday - Mapping and Planning: - The first activity of the camp involved the students developing an understanding of the street names and the grid layout of Melbourne CBD. Simon's storytelling helped the students remember the layout of the city and the name and order of the city railway stations.

Students spent the afternoon researching and planning two student choice activities. Students were asked to suggest an activity, find its location, find out the cost activity and find out how to get there.

Tuesday - City Loop Challenge: Students split into small groups and took up the challenged to find out all of the different exits at each of the stations.

To make this challenge a little more difficult students were only allowed to go around the loop in one direction and use a tram once. This gave everyone lots of opportunity to use self-advocacy





skills to find out details of each station.

Exploration of Flinders St: Students spent time exploring Flinders St train station identifying the different features such as the platforms, concourse levels, entrances and exits and where to find assistance.

Tram stop investigations: If you don't travel in Melbourne you may think that all tram stops are the same. The groups of students found out that city tram stops can be very different. During the investigation students spent time looking at features of the new tram super stops and the older road side or mid-road stops. The groups discussed the safest way to access the stop, the best place to wait for the tram and how and when to get on and off the tram.



Visit to Williamstown beach: This was a popular student choice activity. We all caught a ferry from Southbank down the Yarra River across to the Williamstown pier. We sat in an open sided boat and listened to our guide telling us interesting facts about various features along the way. When we arrived at Williamstown, the group walked from the pier to the beach. After quite a long



walk, we arrived at the beach and took our shoes and socks off. It was a perfect day for standing in the water and chatting to friends.

We had a picnic barbeque dinner and a number of students helped out with the cooking and preparation of the food. We followed this up with 35 flavours of ice-cream from the local shop. Wednesday - Melbourne Central Challenge: Students were given the task of preparing for a pretend 'friend's' birthday party. The students split into small groups and were asked to find a list of items in Melbourne Central shopping centre. All items were related to their 'friend's birthday party'. Students had to take a photo of







the item to ensure they had each item listed. Student choice: Unfortunately the weather was too hot for the chosen activity of rock climbing so the students either went to the movies or played 10-pin bowling.

Thursday - CBD Amazing Race: The final activity for the program was coordinated by a past CMS student Jack Missen. Jack coordinated the race giving the students cryptic destinations via SMS messages. Students were asked to find different locations, complete challenges and answer questions along the way. In small groups they raced over the city using their new knowledge of the CBD layout and making use of technology or the public to help them locate each destination and complete the activity.

Everyone had a great time on camp and we all know the Melbourne CBD a little better now. 💝

I love the beach! I love running, swimming, chasing waves, digging and smelling all the weird smells that the beach has to offer.

For a lot of dogs, the beach is the best place in the world. Guide Dogs love to play at the beach too! When we go to the beach and our harness is taken off, we are just regular pet dogs and we get to run, chase, dig and play like any family dog.

Here's a question for you. Can Guide Dogs go to a dog restricted beach without wearing their harness, even though they are a Guide Dog?

The answer is no, a Guide Dog not wearing their harness is not doing the work of a Guide Dog and is therefore not working in an official way. A Guide Dog not wearing a harness doesn't have the rights of a Guide Dog. If pet dogs can't go to a dog restricted beach then Guide Dogs not wearing their harness are not permitted access to a restricted beach.

Did you know that fact? If the Guide Dog was guiding their handler along the beach and the dog was in harness, then the Guide Dog is certainly allowed on the dog restricted beach. The Guide Dog would not be running, swimming and playing while in harness, so the restriction doesn't count if the dog is working.
